# Coronavirus (COVID 19) is in the Neighborhood

As most of us have heard and read by now, Governor Newsom, County Supervisor and Mayor Garcetti have announced a State of Emergency for the State, Los Angeles County and the City of Los Angeles because of recently diagnosed cases of the Coronavirus (COVID-19). On Tuesday of this week, the second case of COVID-19 in Los Angeles County was confirmed by Kaiser Permanente West Los Angeles Medical Center. Kaiser confirmed they were "overseeing the care of a coronavirus patient who is home in self-isolation and being treated on an outpatient basis." Kaiser is monitoring the patient.

According to the CDC (Center for Disease Control), Patients with COVID-19 have experienced mild to severe respiratory illness. Symptoms can include cough, fever, and shortness of breath and may appear 2-14 days after exposure. Seek medical advice if you develop symptoms and have been in close contact with a person known to have COVID-19 or live in or have recently traveled from an area with ongoing spread of COVID-19. Call ahead before you go to a doctor's office or emergency room. Tell them about your recent travel and your symptoms.

CDC and medical professionals advise that you:

- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing; going to the bathroom; and before eating or preparing food.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Stay home when you are sick.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash.
- Avoid hugging, hand-shaking, etc.;
- Wash your hands frequently and/or use antibacterial hand sanitizer;
- Avoid touching your face

## **Repair of Alley Gates**



Neighbors United recently received a request to pay for repairs the gate at the alley on Guthrie between Crescent Heights and La Cienega Boulevards which was installed several years ago to prevent vagrancy and criminal activity in the alley.

In 1993 City Council approved a Nuisance Alley Conversion Pilot Project (expired) to provide funds to gate and permanently close alleys that have a history of attracting illegal dumping, criminal gang activity, drug dealing and prostitution. Neighbors living on Crescent Heights petitioned the City to have gates installed. Several neighbors had keys to the gates and had responsibility to close and open them daily. Some of the gates are now in disrepair and the neighbors with keys are no longer in the area.

The Nuisance Alley Conversion Project, ran into a few problems over time. According to the City, dozens of gated alleys were choked with weeds and trash because they were neglected by the neighbors responsible for their upkeep. We have been informed that the program no longer exists and repair for the gates is the responsibility of affected neighbors.

Because there are gates along the alley from Guthrie to Saturn, we need to discuss the need for the gates going forward, who is responsible for the repairs and who will be responsible for access to the alley. Should adjacent businesses have responsibility for the maintenance, upkeep and access? These and other issues will be discussed at the meeting on Monday.



The 24<sup>th</sup> **United States Census of 2020** -- National Census Day – will be April 1, 2020. In mid-March, homes across the country will begin receiving invitations to complete the 2020 Census. Once the invitation arrives, you should respond for your home in one of three ways: online, by phone, or by mail.

- March 12 20: Households will begin receiving official Census Bureau mail with detailed information on how to respond to the 2020 Census online, by phone, or by mail.
- March 30 April 1: The Census Bureau will count people who are experiencing homelessness over these three days. As part of this process, the Census Bureau counts people in shelters, at soup kitchens and mobile food vans, on the streets, and at non-sheltered, outdoor locations such as tent encampments.
- April 1: Census Day is observed nationwide. By this date, every home will receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census. Once the invitation arrives, you should respond for your home in one of three ways: online, by phone, or by mail. When you respond to the census, you'll tell the Census Bureau where you live as of April 1, 2020.
- April: Census takers will begin visiting college students who live on campus, people living in senior centers, and
  others who live among large groups of people. Census takers also begin conducting quality check interviews to
  help ensure an accurate count.
- May July: Census takers will begin visiting homes that haven't responded to the 2020 Census to help make sure everyone is counted.
- December: The Census Bureau will deliver apportionment counts to the President and Congress as required by law.
- 2021
- March 31: By this date, the Census Bureau will send redistricting counts to states. This information is used to redraw legislative districts based on population changes.

California is likely to lose a congressional seat for the first time in history after this year's Census, with the state's slowing growth rate. It will also shape presidential politics, as California loses one of its votes in the electoral college for elections in 2022 through 2030.

Dozens of federal programs use census data to help direct funding to state and local areas. Census results help determine how more than \$675 billion in federal funding is allocated to states and communities each year for








